Congratulations to Mr Abisha Kaseke who graduated with his Masters in Education specializing in Socio-Education. We are proud to have Mr Kaseke on our team. His hard work and dedication shows. Well done! His class conducted a short interview with him regarding his achievement:

What were you studying and what was your motivation?

"I was studying towards my master's degree in education specializing in socio-education. My motivation was to investigate ways to improve the teaching and learning of the African child."

What was your dissertation titled and why did you think it was important to carry out the research?

"The dissertation was on 'The influence of initiation rite on male learners at a selected school in the Amatole East district'. This was after I noticed the initiation rites ceremony resulted in learners' behaviour changing before and after. I also thought that partaking in the study would motivate my learners and younger family members to develop an interest in their studies and surpass me."

How long did it take to complete your degree and were there some difficulties you faced in your studies? How did you overcome the challenge?

"The study took two and half years. The biggest challenge I faced was time management especially because I also had high school classes that needed me. To overcome the challenge, I had to learn to work at night, during weekends and any other free time I got."

Did you ever feel like giving up and if so, what kept you going?

"Yes, at times I felt drained because UNISA was expecting a comprehensive research but since my learners and colleagues were part of the study, they kept motivating me not to give up. The support from family and friends pushed me all the way to the end."

As a child, did you know that you would end up as an inspiration and a role model to many learners?

"I was raised by the community that valued Ubuntu and as a result I am expected to spread the good teachings I received. A lot may have changed about how communities live but if you plant wisdom and love in young hearts, you will have half won the battle against socio challenges that the community faces daily. I am honored if my learners learn as much from me in my living years and pray and trust that it will make them better people going forward."

Lastly any words of motivation to everybody out there who wants to follow in your footsteps?

"The most important thing is to accept that everyone is unique, and our God-given gifts are not the same. Focus on your talents and do your best in everything you do. Be good and kind to fellow man and never neglect the society that raised you. Be a good example to everyone and always remember as much as there are challenges in life, 'Nothing can stop a good person.' "
